A Message From Our Executive Director Dr. Helen V. Griffith

Greetings to The Preuss Family of Learners:

Welcome to the fall season of the 2021-22 academic year. We are grateful to be in service to you and your scholars. This year has been filled with challenges and triumph. We were able to successfully return to in-person learning on The Preuss campus with a full staff and all scholars in grades 6 through 12. In spite of the persistence of COVID-19, we have been able to minimize the campus spread due to the numerous protocols in place on the campus of UC San Diego. We are thankful for your support in taking advantage of our vaccination clinics. ensuring all scholars complete the daily COVID screener, reinforcing the importance of masking at all times, using good hygiene and sanitization, and working to follow the guarantine and isolation periods when necessary. Your diligence has helped to maintain a safer campus for all members within our learning community. Thank you.

We are currently working to return to our school schedule of 8:55 am to 4:00 pm for the next academic year, August of 2022. We are excited to announce that MTS will launch a Blue Line that will have its first riders on November 21st of this year. As we seek to return to our traditional schedule and employ a sustainable and green transportation plan, our high schoolers will have the opportunity to pilot using the Blue Line Trolley this academic year free of charge. We have worked with SANDAG and MTS and advocated to support free transportation passes for all scholars, ages 18 and under. This new initiative passed and will launch in March, 2022. At that time, it is the hope that some of our high schoolers will pilot riding the Blue Line. Please stand by for more Parent and Scholar Town Hall meetings to address our innovative initiatives to create transportation justice for all.

It is our plan to move to a Preuss Electric Bus Fleet in the near future. The electric buses will provide daily transportation to our middle schoolers, internships, job shadows, field trips, athletic events, academic competitions, Saturday Enrichment Academy and parent training activities. We will keep you posted on our progress.

We will continue to plan the structures to support each of our scholars academic growth, social and emotional well-being, and preparation for successful living habits. We will celebrate our Preuss Family connections in our Annual Thanksgiving Luncheon on Friday, November 19. It is during this time that we will give thanks for all the many benefits that we enjoy as a Preuss Community of Learners over a traditional Thanksgiving meal.

Please accept our sincerest thanks for the support of your scholar and our school. I firmly believe that our scholars will experience a wealth of success because of your involvement in their educational journey.

Hello All!

Happy Holiday Season from the health office! Here are some reminders and resources:

COVID-19 Updates

COVID-19 vaccinations are now available to San Diego children ages 5 and older.

The California Department of Public Health has approved Pfizer's COVID-19 vaccine for use in 5- to 11-year-olds, and health care providers in the region are now vaccinating children in this age group.

The Pfizer vaccine is the only COVID-19 vaccine currently authorized for use in 5- to 11-year-olds and 12- to 17-year-olds. Parents should take their children ages 5 to 11 to their primary pediatrician for a vaccine, but if that is not an option, the majority of County-operated <u>COVID-19 vaccination sites</u> also carry the Pfizer vaccine, as do many pharmacies, clinics and other medical providers. Parents can also visit <u>MyTurn.ca.gov</u> or call the hotline at 833-422-4255 to find a nearby vaccination site.

California Department of Public Health guidelines for enjoying the Holidays in 2021

As you gather with friends and family, keep COVID-19 in mind. Take steps to prevent its spread.

- <u>Get vaccinated</u>. It's the best way to protect others.
- Keep gatherings small
- If everyone at an indoor gathering is fully vaccinated, masks are optional
- If your guests are unvaccinated or you don't know their status, plan gatherings that are small,

short, and outdoors.

- Wear a mask over your nose and mouth:
 - When social distancing is not possible
 - When you might be around unvaccinated people, especially indoors
 - When around older individuals or people with medical conditions.
- When gathering inside, ventilate well. Open doors and windows, run HVAC systems, and install high-quality air filters.
- <u>Check local conditions</u>. Your county may have stricter guidance than the state. Take extra precautions when local levels of virus transmission are high.
- <u>Activate CA Notify</u> and ask your guests to do the same. CA Notify anonymously notifies individuals of a possible exposure.
- <u>Get tested</u> if you have COVID-19 symptoms. <u>SD</u> <u>County Free testing sites</u>.
- Stay home if you are sick

Health Office Reminders

*If your scholar is not fully vaccinated, they must comply with twice weekly COVID-19 testing. Testing is performed on campus outside of the health office.

Protocol for ill students:

Reminder that your scholar should complete the COVID-19 symptom screener daily. If they experience ANY of the following symptoms: *fever, chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, and/or diarrhea* they should stay home and contact Preuss Health Office. COVID-19 testing is necessary before returning to campus.


Preuss Studiostatic

Being back on campus has inspired Preuss artists to new heights! While Studio I students have been creating ceramic pieces and graphite portraits, Studio II artists have been studying climate change on our marine ecology. ArtsbusXpress generously funded a trip for 50 art and drama students to visit the Canyons of La Jolla lithomosaic at La Jolla Shores. There we met up with marine biologists Beth Besom and Shawna Weaver from the Walter Munk Foundation for the Oceans. We were also honored to meet the wife of the late Walter Munk, Mary Munk, who welcomed us and gave us an account of Walter Munk's contributions to oceanography, marine biology, and humanity (his work helped in planning the landing at Normandy during WWII).

Because climate justice is inexorably linked to the condition of all living systems, and especially of concern for marginalized populations, we have held this thread in our curriculum. One way in which art plays a role in the community, locally or globally, can be in service of activism. The lithomosaic demonstrates how art can highlight information, serve to activate those who want to help reverse the anthropogenic effects on marine life, and inspire sustainable practices large and small.

Over the last five years, art students have worked with the Torrey Pines State Reserve to learn about and see firsthand the unfolding of climate change and the effects on the ecology of the park. We work with Ellie Cohen, CEO of the Climate Center in Northern California-<u>https://theclimatecenter.org/</u>, who is seeking a carbon neutral CA by 2030 and just went to the COP26 in Glasgow as an official Observer NGO, Scripps Institute -specifically the Latz Lab -<u>https://latzlab.ucsd.edu/</u> and the Walter Munk Foundation for the Oceans-<u>https://waltermunkfoundation.org/</u>. We also work with ArtsbusXpress who funds all the bus trips to these locations!

Each of our community partners not only teach us about the issues, offer ways in which we can all participate in activism and sustainable practices, but also have offered Preuss students career pathways in these fields. Anyone from an accountant to an artist, a scientist to an engineer can find a place at the table. For Preuss scholars these experiences are invaluable. Working with the amazing individuals at these organizations models career paths for Preuss scholars.

Drama students participated in the trip because they were in the midst of a unit on documentary film styles. This was a perfect "real life" opportunity for Drama students to approach the documentary genre from different cinematic and narrative approaches. Each team did not make the same documentary, rather every group was tasked with a perspective, a narrative, and had to select an aesthetic. For example, one group chose to interview the marine biologists about their work with the Foundation, another group made a black and white visual narrative of the ocean, another group wanted to capture a day in the life of a Preuss student, etc.

Documenting our learning while learning, discovering career paths and learning the effects of climate change and future steps to halt it are the tangible educational results of our off campus opportunities; however, these experiences also support student social-emotional learning as well as their physical and mental health. The field trip included a long walk down the beach from Kellogg park to the Scripps Pier, enjoying the sunshine, surf and conversation. We were accompanied by the retired and beloved Mr. Romer who spent time catching up with students' achievements and gave encouraging advice for the future. From the pier we walked to Scripps Mary Birch Aquarium where students were awed by the jellyfish, touch tanks and view. The view of the Pacific was sparkling and a relief to our screen-weary eyes!

Also in October, the Honors and AP Studio art students ventured to Torrey Pines State Reserve for a nature hike, plein air painting and an update on changes to the Torrey Pines as a result of increasing climate change. Students enjoyed the day in nature and a special lunch donated by our long time donor, Ron Campnell who sponsors this trip every year. Our trips to TPSR gives students a scientific perspective on our local environment as well as an opportunity to engage nature and interpret it through their artistic expression.

Our Ballet Folklorico group, Berenice Lopez Colon ('22), Dayana Yudho Garcia ('22), Ruby Santiago ('22), Xochitl Garcia ('22), Daniela Navarrete ('22), and Wendy Vidal ('22) also performed during the celebration. They were later joined by Viviana Rojas to dance another traditional Hispanic Dance.





In addition the Multicultural Empowerment Club also celebrated Day of the Dead in remembrance of our loved ones. Day of the Dead is a Mesoamerican, two-day celebration meant to guide the spirits of departed loved ones in the afterlife. Students were able to partake in a number activities including face painting, chalk art, flower making, and much more! Areli Hernandez also performed during this event as well as the Preuss Choir. The Preuss Choir sang Remember Me and La Llorona from Disney Movie Coco.



Ofrenda Gallery Walk 2021



The World Language Department Spanish IV classes hosted an Ofrenda Gallery Walk. The Ofrenda Project focuses on honoring ancestors. Students shared their cultural beliefs and traditions as they learned about Dia de los Muertos, a celebration of Life, celebrated in different parts of Spanish-speaking countries and communities. As a way to share such celebrations, each student selected a family member or someone that they admire and created an Ofrenda.

An Ofrenda or altar is an offering in honor of individuals who have passed away. Students and faculty members took this opportunity to remember and honor the lives of individuals who have departed but still live in our hearts. Students learned about the main elements of the altares in the traditional Mexican culture and as they learned they planned their Ofrenda in several stages. Stage 1 focused on researching ancestors and asking family about the individual. Some students researched the individuals that they admire and focus on their contributions to society. Stage 2 focused on the planning of the Ofrenda. Students decided what materials to use to create the Ofrendas, and the elements that they would include based on the Mexican traditions. Stage 3 focused on the decorations of the Ofrenda followed by stage four preparation for presentations in target language. This year our students used shoe boxes to create their ofrendas. Elements to include in the Ofrenda were candles, flowers, water, salt, earth, wind, and personal objects. Stage 5 was presentations and final staging of the display of Ofrendas to the school.

This year, students invited younger students, staff and parents to visit the Ofrendas. During this Gallery, attendees had the opportunity to learn about students' ancestors and see their creative way of honoring their loved ones. In addition, attendees had a moment to reflect and remember those who have passed away during the past years and as a way to honor those indi-

viduals, students placed a flower on an Ofrenda dedicated to their loved ones.

Seniors are Zeus and their colors are white.


Juniors are Aphrodite and their colors are shades of red.
