

### Opportunities:

- 2. Free access to eBooks through Open eBooks
- 3. San Diego Public Library Summer Reading Program begins June 1st. We will have librarians here from the North University Community branch during MS and HS lunch in June 5 to sign students up for the program.

It will soon be time for students to return all materials. All computers, chargers and hotspots will also be collected. Each student is responsible for returning all items checked out under their name.

- All library books are due by Friday, June 6th
- All textbooks are due by Monday, June 16th. Textbooks may be turned in early, if no longer needed for class
- All 6th and 8th graders must keep their Wordly Wise workbook for the next school year. If they lose it they will have to buy a new one next school year. The cost is \$13.00
- All chrome books, laptops, chargers and hotspots will also be collected by Monday, June 16th. All devices must be updated over the summer. If your student is in summer school we will check out a device on the first day of summer school.

At the beginning of the school year, we announced to all students if there was any damage in their textbooks to bring it to our attention to make a note so the student is not held responsible for the damage. We will be charging students at least \$5.00 if the damage is beyond the normal wear and tear. Students must remove any papers/post-its, erase any pencil markings or pictures and white out any ink markings that should not be there. It is important that every student treat all their textbooks with care and respect so that future classes will have access to good quality books.

All 12th grade students must turn in all devices, library and textbook materials and pay all fines before receiving their cap and gown for the graduation ceremony. All 8th grade students must turn in all devices, library and textbook materials before participating in the "Celebration of Learning" ceremony. A <u>letter</u> was sent home in May with all 8th and 12th grade students to be signed, informing parents/guardians of the requirements for their student to receive their cap and gown or to participate in the 'Celebration of Learning'. # 6th Grade STEM Field Trip!

On March 18, the Class of 2031 visited Ringer's Roller Rink for a STEM field trip! The 6th graders had to think like engineers to brainstorm, design, and build balloon-powered roller skates. They were each tasked with making their skate travel 5 feet on balloon power with only the supplies given. They had chances to test their design, re-design, and complete their mission. After the experiment and competition of whose balloon travelled the farthest, students enjoyed roller skating time! Many of them improved their skating skills so much throughout the hour-skate session and had a lot of fun. All 6<sup>th</sup> graders also received a free admission pass to Ringer's Roller Rink to return for another day of skating with their family.






On Saturday, March 15 Preuss students competed at the San Diego Regional Science Olympiad. Students worked in teams to complete a series of events that tested their scientific knowledge and engineering skills. In the popular Towers event, students designed and built wooden structures that were tested for their ability to hold weight while staying light. In the Codebusters event, students decoded scrambled messages using a variety of ciphers, while in the Forensics event students solved an imaginary crime using chemistry and physics. Other students competed in events related to air-powered projectile launchers, writing scientific procedures, working with laser optics, building robotic vehicles, and learning about diseases and anatomy.

# Joining a Swift Moving Current

When I joined our school community earlier this year as incoming Chief Administrative Officer, I felt like I was jumping into a swift-moving current. The work of the school was already underway—students learning, teachers teaching, systems humming along...

Jumping in midstream meant figuring things out quickly, listening carefully, and learning the unique rhythms of a team already in stride. I have ridden the current and tried my best to keep my head above water! To be honest it has been exciting, daunting, and at times overwhelming.

The experience of joining a well-established community has given me a deeper empathy for our scholars—especially those who are new to our school or who are still trying to find where they belong. Whether you're a 6th Grader entering into an advisory classroom for the first time, a high school student transferring midyear, or even a returning student looking for deeper connection, it's not always easy to find your way in a space that's already in motion.

I recently had the chance to speak with Ms. Maria Gonzalez, one of our amazing school librarians. She shared with me about how she saw a need for scholars who were new to the school to have a safe space to go during lunch, so she created a club that gave them responsibilities in the library and an opportunity to connect socially with others. What a wonderfully inclusive way to create a sense of belonging!
