

Dear Parents and Guardians of our Esteemed Scholars,

There are a few changes from that we are making to our attendance processes in order to both reward and address some of our attendance items.

In response to the growing amount of unexcused tardies, we have implemented lunch duty for students that earn 5 tardy points. This entails that they use their lunch time to help our custodial staff with trash pickup. Students that assigned are detention are sent home with a referral signed bv parent/guardian, and the advisory teacher is also made aware.

Library notices are sent via students' @preuss.ucsd.edu email at the beginning of each month. Notices inform the students what library materials and textbooks are late, and what fines to be paid or waived by volunteering. Every half hour in the library waives \$5.00 off their fines. Students may volunteer in the mornings before school or during their lunch.

Online library information is on the <u>Preuss School website</u>. A great feature is <u>Brainfuse</u>, 24/7 access to live tutoring in most core subjects and many electives. Tutors have degrees in their subjects and all conversations are monitored. We have links to our databases, Sora by Overdrive (our ebook collection site) and many other resources. Sora is also accessible by downloading the SORA APP on their phone, finding the Preuss School and using their student ID number to login.

Announcing New Partnership with OpSam Health!

OpSam Health started as a small group of volunteer doctors and nurses with a shared goal to provide culturally and linguistically competent health services to families, and has expanded since then to include 7 different clinics across the San Diego region. Now, OpSam Health is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), and continues to provide healthcare services to members of the community across San Diego regardless of a person's ability to pay. OpSam Health offers services including primary care for adults and children, dental, mental health, specialty services, and more.

OpSam Health has recently partnered with the Preuss School at UCSD to offer a public health prevention curriculum called the Resourceful Adolescent Program (RAP-A) to 7th grade students. Through this initiative, 7th graders will learn and practice new skills to manage stress, solve problems, recognize their own strengths and abilities, and connect with peers and other people in their community. As the program's goal is prevention, this curriculum does not treat mental health issues but instead works to prevent issues such as depression or anxiety from happening in the first place. In addition to providing the Resourceful Adolescent Program, OpSam Health also provides mental health services to Preuss students of any grade in need of additional support. Whether a parent/guardian wants guidance in navigating challenges in areas such as healthcare, education, or social services or a student needs support with developing healthy friendships or dealing with academic stress, OpSam Health is here to help.



Hello! My name is Rachael Caires, and I am a Behavioral Health Clinician with OpSam Health working at the Preuss School. I grew up in a small town in Alaska, and later lived in Arizona and Colorado before coming to San Diego where winters no longer exist and shorts are worn year-round. I earned my Bachelor of Science in Psychology from Northern Arizona University in 2013, and began working with children, youth, and families in community mental health settings right after graduation. I enjoyed helping kids and teens figure out their everyday lives so much that I went on to earn my Master's degree in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from the University of San Diego in 2018 to become a Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor in California.

Since then, I've had the wonderful opportunity to continue supporting kids, teens, and parents/guardians in residential, inhome, outpatient, and school-based settings providing both prevention services as well as mental health treatment. I'm particularly passionate about prevention services for youth as I believe one of the best ways to deal with problems is to stop them before they happen and empowering youth to face life with confidence. I greatly value including humor, creativity, and play into all my sessions and therapeutic interactions with youth and their families as they are often the key ingredients to growth and a healthier self. Working with families over the last 10 years has shown me that kids and teens have so many strengths, interests, and abilities, and supporting them is often a matter of learning to use those strengths and abilities to handle challenges. Whether we're talking about feeling lonely or Pokémon, I'll be working to help students become their best selves.



Hello! My name is Wendy Garcia. I grew up in Mexico and spent my early career as a professional singer, even living and performing in Bahrain. Music allowed me to connect with people worldwide, but life took an unexpected turn when I became a mother. Navigating the challenges of raising a child with mental health and developmental needs opened my eyes to the struggles many families face. At first, I felt lost, searching for answers and support, but that journey led me to something even greater—a passion for helping others.
